Eámonn, whose photographs appeared in a UNESCO exhibit in Paris in 2019, graduated with a major in Art Education and has since been very busy making his mark in the world. "Since graduating, I worked as an art teacher for three years and spent the summers traveling. My first summer I went to India to retrace the route of a study abroad trip I had done while at Longwood. I was trying to see some more of the country
